November Meeting Minutes

President Jay Batcha called the November meeting to order at 7:03 P.M. with 15 in attendance. He welcomed visitors Tim and daughter Andrea.

Adoption of the minutes: The reading of the minutes from the previous meeting to be taken from the newsletter. A motion was made and the members approved.

Treasurer Report: Susan Hargrove gave the Bank C.D. and savings account balances. She mentioned collecting some dues and money from selling all the 500 grab bags and some




teacher kits at the Fair. She also said everything was paid up.

Programs: Tina Perkins said she was speaking tonight on Geological Features of the South Eastern United States and for the December 5th meeting our Club Christmas Party. She also mentioned the February / March Speakers would be Bill Mayer and Jay Batcha.

Newsletter: Tina Perkins said the deadline for members to send in input was November 12th.

Old Business: Jay Batcha thanked everyone for helping at the Fair and mentioned the upcoming Christmas Party on December 5th at 7 P.M. He said the Club would furnish the meat (ham) and members are to bring a side or dessert and drink. He proposed the Club getting a Honey baked Ham and Members approved. A scholarship will be drawn for eligible members who would like to go to the William Holland or Wild Acres Schools of Lapidary Arts. Details of the classes were discussed and he said to let Club Officers know if you are interested to be in the drawing and not able to attend the Party. Tina Perkins gave a report on the educational presentation she and George Ruff put on for 3rd Graders at Heritage Elementary School.

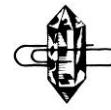
Field Trips: Jay said there was a Roadside Dig Trip collecting Hematite, Goethite and

Limonite in Buena Vista, Georgia on December 10th. He had some information on the meeting place and times which will also be in the Newsletter. Susan Hargrove mentioned the upcoming Southeast Federation of Mineralogical Societies Annual meeting November 18-20, 2022 at the Cobb County Civic Center in Marietta, Ga. She said anyone wanting to go and represent the Club would have paid lodging and per diem. She also mentioned the Cobb County Gem and Mineral Society show would be going on there also. Tina gave information on a DMC (Dixie Mineral Council) field trip on December 3rd to Morris Island in Charleston Harbor, South Carolina to collect Fossils. This is a Dredge Pile and requires a \$50.00 boat ride fee. Jay said he met a man at the Fair that wanted to sell his dad's collection of Lapidary Equipment consisting of trim saws, tumblers, faceting and polishing machines. He had slide show of pictures and an E-Mail address to contact seller. Tina had a slide show of different designs of T-Shirts for the Club using the Club's new Digital Emblem. She asked for ideas and suggestions as members voted on the styles they like. Discussion was had and it will be decided on later.

Mineral of the Month: Jay said the MOM is Zircon and asked George Ruff to stand in for Tuell Walters as Educational Chairperson. George said Zircon was small common crystals found in Igneous Rocks and some Metamorphic Rocks. Found in many colors with a Mohs Hardness of 7.5. Several specimens were on display and a raffle followed with prizes.

Rock of the Month: Pegmatites general composition are of Feldspar, Quartz and Mica with interlocking Crystals and Minerals. Found worldwide in Igneous Rock with deposits in Georgia. Members had rocks on display with a drawing for prizes following.

Speaker of the Month: Club Newsletter Editor Tina Perkins was speaking on Geological Formations of the South Eastern



United States. She had a slide show with information and pictures on these Topics of interest. Sink Holes - Are numerous in Florida and some in other States. Caves and Caverns - Formed from Limestone with many in Alabama, Tennessee and Kentucky. Monadnocks - Are isolated dome shaped Granite outcroppings. Georgia Monadnock mountains are Arabia, Kennesaw, Panola and Atlanta's Stone Mountain Georgia. Stone mountain features depression ecosystems that are unique to the area and found nowhere else in the world. Blue Holes can be Freshwater or Marine Caverns or Sinkholes near river banks coral reefs. There is one on the Flint River. Gorges and Canyons - Many are located in Georgia, North Carolina and West Virginia. Tina mentioned traveling to Tallulah Gorge in northeast Ga., Providence Canyon in Lumpkin Georgia was formed from poor farming practices (erosion), Cloudland Canyon in North West Ga., and one of oldest on the Continent, New River Gorge in West Virginia which allows for plants and animal to move from the east side of the Appalachians to the west and into the mid-west. She also showed plants that were common in each area. Mountains and Waterfalls - The Appalachian Mountains run from Maine to Alabama but in the southeast, they consist of the Smokey Mountains, the Cumberland Plateau and the Blue Ridge Mountains. The Blue Ridge Mountains have thousands of peaks formed from Granitic Charnockite, volcanic formations, and sedimentary limestone. Along this chain of Mountains are many Waterfalls with the Cumberland Falls in Kentucky being noted for Moon Bows. Sea Islands - Also known as the Barrier Islands, they were formed 35-40 thousand years ago and 18,000 years ago as ice sheets melted. She showed a cross section picture explaining the Islands makeup of sandbars, beaches, dunes, shrub Zones and Maritime Tree Forests. There are 35 Barrier Islands in South Carolina and 24 in Georgia.

Saturday, December 10, 2022


Buena Vista, Georgia

Trip: To south of Buena Vista, we will be digging/ looking along a dirt road for Goethite, Hematite, and Limonite be sure to fill in any holes and pickup your trash.

Meeting Location: At the south side (East 6th Ave) of courthouse in the square in Buena Vista at 10:00am Georgia time on Saturday December 10, 2022. Will wait no later than 10:05am before heading to dig site. Call Jay if running late.

Bring: Hammers, chisels, scratching tools, pry bar, buckets, paper to wrap specimens, hat, sunscreen, food and drinks, safety glasses, and gloves (most of the material is laying in the ditches along the dirt road so tools are not required).

Directions: At Byron, Ga. Take Exit 149 off of I-75. Turn left onto GA-49 and continue towards Fort Valley. Turn right onto GA-49 Connector W/GA-540 (Fort Valley bypass). Continue on Ga-540/Ga-96 west to Butler, Ga.; Turn left onto Ga-137W to Buena Vista. In Buena Vista turn right onto E 3rd Ave. Then turn left onto Broad St. Turn left onto E 6th Ave. and park at court house. Travel time from Byron to meeting location is 58miles and 1hr 5 minutes. We will then drive about 11 miles to the collecting site south of Buena Vista, Ga. Please RSVP to Jay if you are planning on coming.


GEODE FOR SALE

It has a light inside to highlight the crystals.





I am pulling this month's blast from the past from November of 1988. I decided to start looking at the minutes to see what was going on in the club at the time so here are the Secretary's Report and some other interesting articles.

The October meeting of the Mid-Georgia Gm and Mineral Society was held October 3, 1988 with 26 members and 4 guests. Dan Waltrip, Field Trip Chairman, reported on Georgia Tektites. He hopes to plan a trip around Dodge County. He also plans to have tektite examples at the next meeting. Also, possible trips to Bridgeboro near Albany for fossils, calcite and jasper and Hillsboro for blue quartz when the weather cools off. A motion was made to buy 25 of the Rockhound License patches at \$1.90 each. On Friday October 14th, the fair cases will be moved from storage at Dr. Johnson's and taken to the fair site. John Wilson spoke on Barnes Swamp (should have been Bond Swamp) and Brown's Mountain and the surrounding ecology. He showed an interesting and beautiful video tape of the area.

From Rock Chips, Oct. 88:

 best.

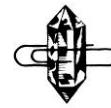
What better way to learn first hand
