October Meeting Minutes

He talked about previous speakers and events that have happened in the last few months. He also talked about the Maker's Challenge and asked if the club wanted to continue to this starting with next month. Club members agreed to continue with the challenge.

Adoption of the minutes: The reading of the minutes from the previous meeting to be taken from the newsletter. A motion was made, and the members approved. Shawn said that Jay, Al, and James were at the fair today.

apologized for not bringing them but she is staying with her mother who is also ill.

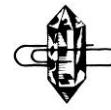

Helen brought lots of artifacts and said that from 12-4 at Indian Springs (McIntosh Hotel) there would be people there to help identify and give information on the artifacts.

Tuell's last auction has been set for November 16th from 12:30- 3:00. Other information will be sent closer to time. The Milner Auction will be held in either March or April with more information to come in February. There are lots of slabs and specimens. Some of the material will be used for later club auctions and as door prizes and drawings.

Speakers: Aaron started off the presentation talking about Native American Artifacts and where to find them. His first suggestion was to ask around to see if anyone has found any. He used the areas where he had been searching to show how to look at the environment to see signs of where they got the stones, where they made the artifacts and then nearby settlements. He found Lithic pieces, pottery from the woodland period, and talked about pictographs from out west as well as organics such as hides and farming. Brooklyn talked about the structures they used such as thatched roof houses and teepees. Shells from the coast were found at the Indian Mounds in Macon. The two junior rock hounds did an outstanding job.

TRIP: Diamond Hill is a South Carolina favorite spot for collecting quartz crystals. The collecting area covers 5-6 acres of turned over earth. Over millions of years, erosion has occurred to the southern part of the Appalachian Mountains which is one of the oldest mountain chains in the world. This has exposed a small 3-acre spot full of some of the widest variety quartz crystals in the world, known as Diamond Hill! Some of the best Amethyst, Smoky, Skeletal (Elestial), Angle Plated, Iron & Manganese Oxide coated, Aura, and other crystals are found here! Other minerals including Beryl, Garnet and Epidote have also been recovered!

COLLECTING: There are several kinds of quartz clusters such as amethyst (harder to find), smokey, skeletal, and druzy. Other

minerals such as garnet, epidote, and beryl can be found by surface collection or digging. There are deep main pits and about 5-6 acres of dirt piles that contain quartz crystals to surface collect or to dig through. Digging is allowed anywhere on the property unless marked and no digging in parking area please.



BRING: Gloves, safety glasses, and tools such as shovel, rake, screwdriver, pick (bamboo skewers help gently dig dirt out from between crystals), trowel or rock hammer. Boxes or flats and newspaper are recommended for carrying your finds. Stout shoes are good for climbing around mounds of turned over dirt. There is no water on site. Bring food and drink. This is an exposed area, so bring sunscreen - even in November!



REQUIREMENTS/RULES:

No throwing rocks in the pit.

No Trailers Allowed

Shirts and Shoes are required for digging.
 Limit on rocks is a car/truck load.



Mineral of the Month


Apatite

Apatite is a mineral containing Calcium, Phosphate and either chlorine, Fluorite, or hydroxide. The name was invented by A.G. Werner in the 1780's from a Greek verb apatit meaning to deceive. It was renamed in 1860 by Carl Rammelsberg to emphasize the chemical composition. Crystals of apatite are short to long hexagonal prisms. Apatite is often confused with beryl, milarite, and phenakite. It can be massive, coarse granular to compact, sub fibrous, scaly, stalactitic, earthy, and oolitic. May be rock forming in beds of great extent or nodular concretions in clays and shales.



Blue Apatite

Fluorapatite is colorless to white when pure, but can also be green, blue, pink, yellow, brown, violet, and purple. It has a vitreous, sub vitreous, resinous, waxy, or greasy luster. Its specific gravity is 3.1-3.25 and it is the "5" on the Mohs hardness scale. It is transparent to translucent. It is found in igneous rocks and metamorphic limestone. It can be found in Alaska, Arizona, Arkansas, California,



Colorado, Connecticut, Delaware, Florida, Hawaii, Idaho, Indiana, Maine, Iowa, Michigan, Maryland, Minnesota, Montana, and many more. In Georgia it can be found in Cherokee County in the Ball Ground Mining District, in Jasper County at the American Feldspar Corp. Pit and the Enon Church Mine, in Lumpkin County at Dahlonega, in Monroe County at Culloden, in Oconee County at North High Shoals, and throughout Upson County including at the Steven Rock Mica Mine, Maulding Mine, and the Mitchell Creek Mine with many others.




Green Apatite

Apatite is used for fertilizer, phosphoric acid, hydrofluoric acid, gemstones, pigments, and ore of rare earth elements.

Rock of the Month

Metaquartzite

Metaquartzite is a rock subtype. It is a granoblastic metamorphic rock consisting mainly of quartz (90%) which gives it a crystalline structure and is formed by recrystallization of sandstone or chert by either regional or thermal metamorphism. It has a medium grain to fine grain composition. It has a sugary appearance. At high magnification other minerals are visible including feldspar and mica. Metaquartzite has a very even texture. This metamorphic rock forms under low pressure and high temperature. It is non-foliated. It is used for decorative dimension stone, as crushed rock for highway construction, and as a source of silica for production of silicon and silicon compounds.

TEMPLATES

Whenever I have to make more than 2-3 exact copies of anything, I think of making a template. A template lets me easily draw the shape of an item. Art stores sell templates for common shapes like circles, ovals, hearts, etc, but if you need other shapes, it's easy to make your own. Simply cut the shape out of sheet plastic, copper or brass. The brass template let's me quickly trace the design of these ginkgo leaf earrings onto silver sheet, and the nickel template makes it easy to drill the pin inlay pattern into the ironwood. After finding a poor selection of stock templates for ovals at my local art store, I was pleased with the wide selection on Cool Tools at <http://www.coolttools.us/> If you order, be sure to look for the 10% off code each month on their Home page.

DENTAL TOOLS

A ready source of free tools is your local dentist. Dental picks can be reworked into wax tools or straightened and sharpened to make a stylus for marking and layout. The steel in these tools is high quality, and the handles are designed for comfort. A special note however - don't try to

bend one of the tips to a different shape - the steel will snap. To change the shape, heat the tip to red hot and bend it with pliers while it's hot. And don't forget to ask your dentist for some of the cutting burs they throw out. These are useful for a variety of things. It's best to call a week or two before your visit and ask the dentist to put some of these tools aside for you. It's good practice also to ask that they run them through the sterilizer for you.

FAKES & FRAUDS

Unfortunately, there's a growing amount of deception and outright fraud these days at gem and mineral shows and in some of the online venues that sell these items. Often "genuine turquoise beads" turn out to be dyed magnesite, and I've been told that the majority of colored stones being sold typically have had some "enhancement" done to them.
